Universal Studios Florida is more oriented towards their indoor attractions, such as Harry Potter and the Escape from Gringotts, Men in Black: Alien Attack, and Revenge of the Mummy, whereas the neighboring Island of Adventure is home to critically acclaimed thrill rides like Veloci-Coaster, Hagrid's Magical Creatures Motorbike Adventure, Incredible Hulk, and Jurassic Park River Adventure, creating a blend of the two concepts between the two parks. Some knew what rides they were most excited for such as VelociCoaster, which is acclaimed as one of the world's best roller coasters; others wanted to get to experience all the ones they could possibly do.
