Berrios who first joined the Diversity Union when two seniors invited her during her freshman year, describes it as a space where students can come together to discuss the challenges within the school. "At first, It was like a support group to talk about the trouble of our school and how we can improve them," she explains. The need for the group is clear to Berrios, who believes that "Vermilion lacks diversity" and that the Diversity Union can serve as a safe space for students who might feel degraded. "It's a good way to reach out to people who aren't currently involved," she adds. Though the Diversity Union is still in its early stages, its members are eager to make an impact.
