If we were to travel back in time to around 10 to 15 years ago, most of the athletic teams of Vermilion High School had seasons to forget. Fast forward to the present day in 2024, and with the fall sports season now all but wrapped up, the Sailors of fall have had several seasons to remember, and one that has really captured this town's hearts is the 2024 campaign of Vermilion football. Several droughts have been ended this season, including the first win over arch rival Firelands since 2013 to bring the Stillman Cup back to Vermilion, defeating western rival Huron to hoist the Win Oar for the first time since 1966, the clenching of the program's first winning season since 2008 after a nail biting win over Port Clinton which led to the team's first 8-2 regular season record since 1985, and going to the playoffs for the second straight year, the first home playoff game in program history, the first time

ever that the program has accomplished the feat of back to back playoff appearances. Most importantly, with last Friday's win over River Valley, the Sailor Football team has won a playoff game for the first time in school history.

Of course, all this success did not just happen overnight; a lot of work had to be put in to make this historic and memorable season come to fruition. Led by senior captains Aaron Mathis, Cohen Mooney, Oliver Roy, and Head Coach DiFucci, the Sailor football team has been working hard since the off-season. DiFucci said they have been "maximizing every opportunity to get better. Get better in the weight room. Never miss a set or a rep. Get better in film study. Know your opponent better and know how they will play you. Get better on the field. Maximum effort and assignment responsibilities." The Sailors all had one goal in mind

and that was to win a home playoff game. Cohen Mooney explained, "in order to win a playoff game and go further, we need to perfect our plays and now all of our assignments, and run every play with 100% effort." The football team has been having a blast, and is looking forward to the next step in their playoff journey this Friday.

Meanwhile, other sports have also had great 2024 campaigns. Cross Country was no exception as they sent senior Joseph Webb to the regional competition in Tiffin. He also was the first Sailor to win Vermilion's very own Obenour since 2008 as the team also finished strong in that race, placing in the top 10. "Ever since the first race, we've gone out and broken barriers we didn't think we would break. We hit the ground running and competed in every race like it was our last, especially considering the majority of us are seniors." Webb said. Of course, this team had success in mind even before the season started. "We were really hopeful to move on to regionals as a team. That was the goal we talked about. Even though that goal wasn't achieved we still tried the best we could and strived to complete our goals." Webb said.

When it came to team leadership, everyone pitched in to keep spirits high. "It's very hard to narrow down one to be honest. All of them were into the team spirit. Everyone played a different part. Joseph led the boys, Ava and Lexi led the girls. Everyone had a role for our team to be successful," head coach Kristina Edmison remarked. "Our tone this year was really upbeat and positive. Everyone wanted to be there and those seniors wanted to finish their careers on a high note. Everyone bought in and worked hard." This really goes to show that sports are a team effort and not everything is accomplished by one singular person. "They started running at the beginning of June. Cross country takes a lot of hard work, and these guys really put themselves through all of it."

The boys golf team also found success this fall with the team making it to districts, but falling short of qualifying for the state tournament. That was the team's first district appearance since 2019. On top of that, the team also won their third SBC championship in seven years, their first since 2017, and the Erie County championship as well. "The season went better than expected; we won the Stillman Cup, the Erie County Championship, an SBC championship, and qualified for districts for the first time since 2019. We had high expectations with 5 seniors and due to a lack of experience for some, I wasn't sure what to think of it," said head coach Joe Schneid. "I've got to give a tip of the hat to Codey Schwarck and Julian Hamman. They really grinded out some of the tough rounds and held us together with their outstanding performance throughout the year."

Schwarck and Hamman were not the only ones that had big years though; freshman Sam Riddle had a breakout first year as a Sailor golfer.

"Definitely Codey, Julian, and Sam Riddle" were who fellow golfer Sevie Kretchmar listed for his most important players of the 2024 season. Going into next season,"I really think the expectation is to be the same, if not better than, what we did this year due to improvement, especially with Sam playing as good as he had been." Kretchmar said. Coach Schneid remarked about the young talent of this group, "We have a lot of young talent returning next season. We hope to repeat as conference champions in particular."

What came out of this fall season came both stories of success and signs of improvement that can be made, but all around, Vermilion has certainly turned the tables in the eyes of others.

This Years Fall Play 'Puffs': A Magical Comedy! by Alivia Berrios


